We want students to be excited and enthusiastic about learning History, as well as understanding the people and events that have shaped both their local communities and the wider world into the diverse society we see today. The Year 8 curriculum builds upon what is learnt in Year 7 by continuing to develop students historical skills, for example analysing sources, as well as developing knowledge of historical concepts such as power and protest movements which are interwoven throughout Key Stage Three.
